From the Board

Welcome to the first edition of the RSPCA Darwin Regional Branch's newsletter for 2009. It has certainly been a busy and eventful start to the new year for the Branch, and for RSPCA Australia. If you followed the news over Christmas you will know that it was, as usual, an incredibly busy period with lots of good and sad news stories.

By the end of 2008, the Branch had received 1646 animals at the Shelter....this equated to approximately 2 animals for every 100 households in the Darwin and Greater Darwin region. Just over 40% of these were re-homed. In the 2007/2008 financial year, the RSPCA Darwin received only 80 less animals than all of Western Australia - an incredible statistic given the size of the Darwin population compared to Perth and surrounds.

Of note is that we are beginning to observe a significant increase in the number of animals being handed in by their owners. It is too early to tell whether this is just a temporal blip or related to either the current financial crisis or the new Darwin City Council By-Laws. We will be monitoring the data closely over the coming months and carefully considering how best to manage this change if it is sustained.

In January we were notified of a completely unexpected but desperately needed one-off Special Purpose Grant of \$50,000 from the Northern Territory Government to support fundraising and education activities. This was enormously exciting and, much to the relief of our hard working Board, the Branch now has a highly experienced part-time marketing and fundraising coordinator, Sue Heenan, who started with us towards the end of March. Sue comes armed with years of experience in a wide range of sectors and a passion to raise as much money for us as she can!

Financially, things are still extremely tight for the Branch and every penny counts, particularly when there are major capital works that need to be addressed within the next few years. We are currently pursuing several private and public grant opportunities and hopefully we will be able to report success with these in the next newsletter. These include applications for funding for office equipment and to facilitate the development of community education resources.

We have now buddied up with RSPCA QLD in their quarterly Art-Union and they are providing lots of support to our new fundraising coordinator. We have commenced work on both Strategic and Business Plans and, together with the Operations Manager, implemented several cost-saving initiatives at the Branch. We will soon be developing new Governance Charters with the assistance of RSPCA Australia.

We are aiming to refurbish the clinic building at the rear of the complex to enable space for fundraising, volunteering and education activities. The space will also be used to set up a retail outlet, with Hill's Science Diet contributing \$4000 to this purpose. We do however need the assistance of qualified tradies, particularly plumbers, electricians, painters and carpenters to make it happen. We are also aiming to source a multi-purpose "people type mover" to help with the transport of animals and fundraising and education activities. Anyone who may be able to offer these services is urged to contact Gillian, the Operations Manager, at the Shelter.

Finally it is with enormous regret and sadness that due to personal reasons Kerry-Ann O'Grady had to step down as President after much too short a time. Kerry-Ann will continue as a member of the Branch and to offer assistance to the Branch as required. We will be electing a new President at the next Board meeting, scheduled for the end of April. We are also yet to identify and appoint a new Treasurer, although several new members have expressed interest in joining the Board in the near future.

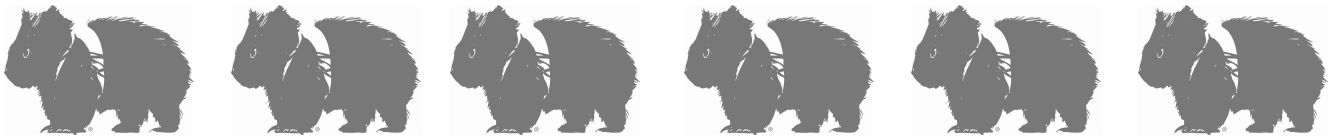




Support the People who Support Us

Shelter Update

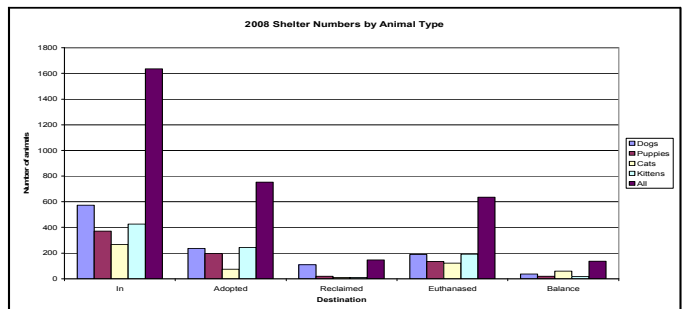
Well 2008 proved to be one of our biggest years with animals coming into the Shelter. We were bursting at our seams by Christmas. Thankfully 2009 has started a bit slower with a slight decrease in the amount of animals coming in compared to this time last year. Furthermore our adoptions so far for 2009 are slightly higher than this time last year so overall a promising start to the year.

Unfortunately though we have noticed that surrenders by owners have significantly increased, almost triple that of the same time last year. Sadly with tough times upon us it seems that pets are sometimes the first cut back for some people.

As some of you may have seen in the paper recently the 3 beautiful Wolfhound-cross dogs found at Casuarina beach nearly 2 months ago are now ready to find their forever homes. All the staff have done a wonderful job in gaining their trust and re-socialising them. They came in cowering and trembling and spent the first 2 weeks here just hiding under their beds. Slowly but surely with lots of cuddles and treats they came out of their shell and are now happy and playful dogs. It always amazes me that no matter how much grief an animal goes through in their life, with a little bit of time they will again put their trust in us and become a loyal friend.

Together with Maxine (our volunteer coordinator) we are also starting to involve volunteers to help with some of the daily runnings of the Shelter. Our aim is to be able to provide support to our already busy staff and to improve our animal care and interaction time.

But don't feel left out if you're not quite into pooper scooping or scrubbing!! We also desperately need people who are happy to volunteer some time to help with gardening. So if you have a green thumb and some spare time, come in and sign up. I think 2009 is going to be a good year for the Shelter, with many exciting events for everyone to enjoy, and hopefully we will be able to start on some much needed upgrades. *Gillian*



Fundraising Hits!

"Hotel for Dogs" Movie Premiere

January saw a fantastic start to the fundraising year with an incredibly successful charity premiere screening of the "Hotel for Dogs" movie at the Birch Carroll & Coyle Casuarina complex. 300 people attended the event, with tickets sold out minutes after the box office opened! In addition to the movie, the proceeds of which were all donated to the RSPCA by BCC, there was a charity auction and some fabulous raffles. RSPCA dogs, puppies, cats and kittens were on show and the Darwin City Council helped out with information about responsible pet ownership and the new By-Laws that came into effect from 1 July 2008.

The trailer to the movie was a fabulous slide show produced by one of our volunteers that showcased our animals and the work we do. The event raised over \$6000 for the RSPCA Darwin but even more importantly the extensive media coverage it generated both before and after the day made a significant contribution to raising public awareness. To all the sponsors, promoters, volunteers, staff and movie-goers who made the day such a success, thank-you! We would also like to extend our gratitude to Territory 104.1 FM and the Northern Territory News for the great media coverage we received.



Australia's Open Garden Scheme

The renowned Australia's Open Garden Scheme is well underway with its 2009 season. As with previous years, several of Darwin and Palmerston's most beautiful gardens are open for display, with their passionate keepers donating considerable amounts of their proceeds to the RSPCA Darwin Regional Branch. The first for the year was the native suburban garden of Lesley Alford in Milner on 4th & 5th of April. It was an enormous success and raised over \$2000 for the Branch! Animal Awareness Week

The Animal Welfare Branch of the Northern Territory Department of Local Housing and Government will be hosting an Animal Awareness Week from 22—28 June 2009. The aim of the week is to raise awareness about the care and protection of animals in the community. Numerous organisations will be holding events around the NT.

RSPCA Nhulunbuy

Many years ago the RSPCA Darwin recognised a group of dedicated volunteers in Nhulunbuy as a sub-branch of Darwin. In addition to the care and protection of unwanted and stray companion animals, the RSPCA Nhulunbuy has played an active role in assisting remote Indigenous communities in the region with dog welfare and control. Despite a small group of only 10 volunteers and no funding other than public donations, the Branch has managed to maintain much needed animal welfare activities in the region.

Over the years, and given multiple changes in management and priorities in Darwin, the relationship became less clear. RSPCA Darwin has recently re-invigorated that connection and are assisting the Nhulunbuy Branch in addressing RSPCA policy and ensuring they are able to continue to provide much needed animal welfare services in that remote region of the NT. We look forward to an exciting future of consolidating RSPCA activities in the Top End.

RSPCA Fancy Felines Shine Again at the NT Cat Show!

The first Cat Association of the NT event was held on 22 March 2009 and eight of our special cats from the Shelter were on show. Cuddles, one of our very sweet boys, won first prize in the male domestic cat category, Eva won in the female domestic category and Pepper Ann won in the female section. All eight of our cats returned to the Shelter with ribbons!

The success of our cats at the Show is testimony to the quality of care and attention they receive at the Shelter. Staff and volunteers can take credit for their high level of health and outstanding personalities.

A bright smile at reception!

Gill and the team at the Boulter Road Shelter are now supported by a new part-time administrative assistant/receptionist. Sharee, a part-time animal attendant for several months, was the successful applicant for the position that was considered necessary to improve customer service at the Shelter and to streamline administration activities.

Sharee has already made significant improvements to office systems, including the development of detailed operations policies and procedures. We have also been fortunate to have volunteers manning the telephone before public opening hours, ensuring that calls from the public are answered in a timely and efficient manner.

The aim is to also recruit suitable volunteers to staff reception on the weekends. Not only will this improve customer relations but will also enable our animal attendants to spend more quality time with the animals in the Shelter, including socialisation and basic behaviour training.

Crocodiles in the Northern Territory

It has probably been impossible not to miss the media surrounding recent crocodile attacks and deaths around the Darwin urban and rural regions over the past few months. Calls for a crocodile cull, and allowing the resumption of trophy hunting, are now dominating the print and talk-back media.

The NT Government has released a draft management plan for public comment by 29 May 2009. The draft is available at: www.nt.gov.au/nreta/wildlife/programs/crocodile/index.html. The RSPCA will review that plan and provide feedback. Briefly, the RSPCA Australia position on the current debate is as follows:

- Improving public education about swimming in areas where crocodiles are present would be far more effective than killing individual crocodiles.
- With interactions between humans and crocodiles increasing, it is timely that the NT Government is reassessing its approach to crocodile management
- The RSPCA does not want to see safari hunting back on the agenda. The RSPCA is opposed to hunting wild animals for sport and the recent tragedies in the NT should not be used as impetus to reignite this debate.
- With respect to culling in general, any control measures to control crocodile populations must be both justified and humane
- Where culling is deemed necessary, it must only be carried out by trained professionals, it must only be part of a wider management plan, and it must be humane.

Lucky Lucy



Lucy is the star of the RSPCA QLD/Darwin Art Union and a recent media sensation in the Northern Territory News. Lucy is testimony to the dedication of the RSPCA Darwin Staff, Volunteers, Foster Carers and Board Members in turning a dreadful beginning into a bright and happy future.

Lucy is the classic story of a puppy given to someone who could not adequately feed and care for her. By the time she arrived at the Shelter she was in dire straits. It was only the commitment of two of our Board Members, Jo and Damion, who took her home for intensive care over a four month period, at their own expense, that gave Lucy the chance for a new life. Much to the excitement of all, in early April a wonderful couple from Howard Springs succumbed to that wagging tail and happy smile and offered her a new forever home. While Lucy will continue to need medication for the rest of her life, her future is most definitely bright.

Help us help others like Lucy. Spread the word about our events and fundraising activities. Similarly encourage your neighbours and friends to think carefully before bringing home a pet and discourage the giving of pets as gifts without the person's consent.

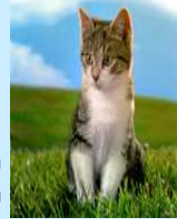

Volunteering Update

There has been an enormous amount of activity over the past few months directed at re-invigorating the volunteer programme at the RSPCA Darwin. This includes a review of all registered volunteers, improving the quality of volunteer registration and orientation processes, developing structure and coordination around volunteer activities and developing various procedures and policies.

Some changes to what has occurred in the past are underway; for example, a review of our insurance policy has now meant that children under the age of 12 can no longer register and participate as volunteers. Young people aged 12–15 years must still be accompanied by a registered adult. Given there is an important role for children in animal welfare, plans are underway to develop a kids' club that will include school holiday programmes.

A survey of registered volunteers currently underway is finding that volunteers would prefer some structure to the programme. In light of this, rosters are being developed for the animal enrichment programme with clear lines of responsibility with respect to volunteer coordination at each session. Similarly, there are volunteers with considerable skills needed by the organisation, for example, administration experience.

Various volunteer positions that make use of these skills are now being formalised and will be advertised on the RSPCA Darwin website.

We are also exploring the concept of corporate volunteering, a programme successfully utilised by various RSPCA member societies around the country. These programmes aim to increase the RSPCA Darwin's access to various business and/or corporate skills while allowing those organisations to make a valuable contribution to not-for-profit organisations in Australia.

Given our hardworking volunteer coordinator is only employed for 10 hours a week, some of these changes are taking time. However, they will ensure that there is a safe, professional and highly productive volunteer programme at the Branch.

If you are a registered volunteer but haven't been involved for a while, check out the website to find out what is happening and how you can contribute. More volunteers for the animal enrichment sessions on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons are always needed. With several large events coming up, keep your eyes on the Berrimah Tails newsletter and the website for how you can help.

RSPCA Australia National Activities

Choose Wisely Campaign

The national campaign to free hens from cages is well underway. Choose wisely aims to promote the purchase of free range eggs and is getting restaurants around the country to use only free range eggs in their menus. Since the campaign began it is estimated that over 1,789,000 free range eggs are now being used by participating businesses around the country; a remarkable achievement. Animals at War Memorial

The RSPCA Australia National Council passed a resolution at its recent Council meeting to support the establishment of a national memorial to animals who have served in war. The memorial will be situated at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra and pays tribute to all animals that have assisted service men and women in war-time. The contribution of animals in war is sadly under-recognised; it is hoped the memorial will raise awareness of the important contribution they make to peace.

End Live Exports Campaign

RSPCA Australia continues to lobby government and industry and educate the public about the need to end the live export trade, particularly to the Middle East. RSPCA Australia has joined a global coalition of animal welfare organisations with the common aim of ending long distance animal transport, collectively known as the "Handle with Care Campaign". Detailed information about the Campaign can be found at www.rspca.org.au.

National Food Accreditation

RSPCA Australia is undertaking multiple activities around the humane care and treatment of farm animals from paddock to plate. Producers can now seek RSPCA accreditation that certifies their farming practices meet RSPCA standards. Significant inroads are now being made with layer hens and pork producers. Consumers can identify these products at supermarkets by looking for the RSPCA logo on packaging. Support the campaign by looking for the logo next time you shop.
